Note by the Secretary-General

1. The Assembly of the International Seabed Authority is invited to note that Ye Minn Thein (Myanmar) resigned from the Finance Committee with effect from 21 February 2019. He had been elected by the Assembly at its twenty-second session as a member of the Committee for a term of five years commencing on 1 January 2017 and ending on 31 December 2021 (see [ISBA/22/A/14](#)).
2. Section 9, paragraph 5, of the annex to the Agreement relating to the Implementation of Part XI of the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea of 10 December 1982 provides that, in the event of the death, incapacity or resignation of a member of the Committee prior to the expiration of the term of office, the Assembly shall elect for the remainder of the term a member from the same geographical region or group of States.
3. In accordance with section 9 of the annex to the Agreement, the Committee is to be composed of 15 members with appropriate qualifications relevant to financial matters. Members of the Committee are to be elected by the Assembly.
4. By a note verbale dated 22 February 2019, the Permanent Mission of Myanmar to the United Nations informed the secretariat of the Authority of the nomination of Nyan Lin Aung to fill the seat on the Committee left vacant by Mr. Thein for the remainder of his term ending on 31 December 2021. The curriculum vitae of Mr. Aung is contained in the annex to the present note.
