8. Background information on the organization

TETIAROA SOCIETY: The mission of Tetiaroa Society 501(c)(3) non-profit organization is to ensure island and coastal communities have a future as rich as their past - strengthening their resilience to global

change, by restoring their ecosystems, and preserving their cultures. Grounded in experience and action on Tetiaroa, Tetiaroa Society's vision is to weave enlightened values, traditional knowledge, and scientific understanding into a new fabric for our common island home. Designated by the atoll's owners as the environmental steward of Tetiaroa with authority and responsibility to manage, conserve and protect the entire island, TS develops and carries out conservation and education, hosts scientific research, and curates the island's knowledge-base. We thrive to establish Tetiaroa as a model for island/earth sustainability where businesses and charities work together for the benefit of communities and nature.

BLUE CLIMATE INITIATIVE: In 2019, from Tetiaroa Society spun a program to take ocean and climate action internationally in the form of a program called the Blue Climate Initiative, that is focused on accelerating ocean-based solutions to climate change. BCI enables research and collaboration to combat climate change while protecting our oceans, unlocking solutions to urgent challenges like renewable energy, sustainable food supplies, improved human health, flourishing biodiversity, stewardship of the ocean's resources, and vibrant ocean economies.

VOICE OF THE OCEAN: During the Blue Climate Summit which Tetiaroa Society and the Blue Climate Initiative hosted in May of 2022 in French Polynesia, indigenous voices coalesced to share and amplify the perspectives of indigenous cultures from the Pacific region in regards to the ocean. This movement has since amplified into another TS Program which is creating a network of indigenous leaders and ocean advocates across the Pacific from Canada First Nations to Papua New Guinea.

The organization as a whole has about 15 direct staff, about 40 board members and steering committee members, and a partner network of 60-100 scientists.

Tetiaroa Society has a wide range of activities and connections throughout both the global scientific community and throughout the cultural diaspora of Oceania. We are therefore both concerned about deep ocean matters and able to draw in experts and on a wide range of topics around the deep ocean

14. Briefly outline whether and how the purposes of activities of the organization relate to the work of the Authority.

Tetiaroa Society's activities relate directly to the Authority's work in the area of the granting of licenses for deep sea mining in the Area. Since the Blue Climate Summit in May 2022 that was held in French Polynesia, during which 250+ ocean experts, investors, government and NGO representatives and community leaders came together to accelerate ocean-based solutions to climate change, we have been actively engaged in understanding and elevating indigenous perspectives and the voices of coastal and ocean communities from Pacific Islands especially, whose livelihoods are closely tied to the ocean.

- 15. Briefly outline whether and how your organization intends to contribute to the work of the Authority, for example by providing specialized information, advice or expertise, or by identifying or helping to procure the services of experts or consultants.
 - a. We are uniquely positioned to access marine research because Tetiaroa Society has been conducting environmental stewardship and oceanographic research since 2010. In doing so, it has hosted and collaborated with researchers from across the globe. Additionally, we have close working relationships with the University of Washington, and with UC Berkeley Gump South Pacific Research Station, whose Executive Director Neil Davies serves on our Board and Steering Committee, and brings with him an exhaustive and multi-disciplinary network of marine specialists.
 - b. We have also collected research to better understand present and future green and energy technologies, and the future role critical minerals found in the deep sea will likely play. This effort is guided by the presence on our Steering Committee of Professor Dan Kammen, Director, Renewable and Appropriate Energy Laboratory University of California Berkeley, & Senior adviser for Energy, Climate and Innovation for USAID Power Africa.
 - c. As part of our Voice of the Ocean project Tetiaroa Society is able to gather indigenous elders and experts in order to bring their cultural viewpoints to the discussion of deep sea mining regulations. With the attention that United Nations organizations have given to indigenous rights and cultural heritage we feel that this is an important contribution to ISA deliberations.

These include Working Group Co-Leads Dr. Diva Amon from the Natural History Museum in London and Dr. Robert Blasiak, Researcher at the Stockholm Resilience Centre; group members Hannah Lily, an independent consultant and seabed minerals attorney from the UK; Torsten Thiele, Senior Research Associate from the Institute for Advanced Sustainability Studies at the University of Potsdam, and more.
